Jacobs vows to readers: 'I'm not making this up'



A year or so ago, George Jacobs ended one of his columns in the ACBL Bridge Bulletin with a "good bye" note. He let on that the editors had given him his walking papers, and even an editor's note at the end indicating Jacobs was kidding did little to contain

the flood of emails expressing outrage that the Bridge Bulletin would fire their favorite columnist.

"Several people have come up to me in Seattle," Jacobs says, "and told me how upset they were when they thought I wasn't going to write the column any more."

George's World debuted in the July 2006 issue with a cartoon representation of Jacobs and his friend and foil Claude Vogel on the cover racing through an airport with suitcases spilling their contents. "It's all true," said the cover text.

"It is," Jacobs insists. "I couldn't make this stuff up."

From one misadventure to another, Jacobs keeps the readers laughing, poking fun at himself as he reports on the bizarre events that seem to visit his table regularly.

Jacobs enjoys the oddball events: "My whole philosophy of bridge is to have fun," he says.

His collection of stories is nearly endless, Jacobs says, and it's growing. "Things just keep happening," he says with a laugh.

Jacobs, who lives in the Chicago area, has been a regular – and a regular winner – at NABCs since the mid-Nineties. He played in the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams for the first time in 1996. He won the event four years later.

In all, he has 11 North American championships to his credit and routinely captains teams that contend for major titles. Jacobs is a sought-after speaker and has been the auctioneer at the prestigious Cavendish in recent years. He is one of the Bridge Bulletin's most popular columnists, he owns one of the top limousine companies in the country and he has a beautiful wife, Stacy, and two growing daughters, Joanna and Kate.

Life is good – but it hasn't always been that way.

Starting at age 11 and into his mid-20s, Jacobs was a compulsive gambler, always on the run because of gambling debts and other kinds of trouble. "I was taking the geographic cure," he says.

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Cayne team rides monster session to Reisinger lead

The team captained by James Cayne posted a huge score of 22 in the first semifinal session of the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams to take the lead into today's two final sets. Their carryover advantage is 4.34.

Cayne is playing with Michael Seamon, Alfredo Versace, Lorenzo Lauria, Giorgio Duboin and Antonio Sementa.

Not far off the pace in second place with a carryover of 3.09 are Roy Welland, Bart Bramley, Josef Piekarek and Alexander Smirnov.

Wolpert ahead in N.A. Swiss Teams

With two final sessions to play, the Gavin Wolpert team will take a carryover of 40 victory points, nearly double that of second place, into today's play in the Keohane North American Swiss Teams.

Wolpert's squad is Paul Fireman, John Hurd, Joel Wooldridge, Krzysztof Buras and Grzegorz Narkiewicz.

Trailing by 19.58 VPs are Geeske Joel and teammates Tobi Sokolow, Jill Levin, Debbie Rosenberg, Jill Meyers and Janice Seamon-Molson.

Easterners lead Super Seniors

Harry Gellis from Midlothian VA and Ed Lazarus from Baltimore MD are leading the Super Senior Pairs by a very narrow margin going into the second and final day of play.

Gellis and Lazarus posted a 64.13% afternoon session to give them a 22.08-point carryover. On their heels are Darwin Afdahl, Oro Valley AZ, and Jerry Gaer, Scottsdale AZ, who enter Sunday with a 21.11-point carryover – a mere .97 off the lead.

Lazarus was playing with a different partner – Jess Stuart -- when he won the event last year in its inaugural appearance on the NABC calendar.

Two qualifying sessions on Saturday narrowed the 17-table field to 10 tables.

Sometimes bad luck is better than no luck

On this deal from the first semifinal session of the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs, the field played in the normal, pushy 4♥, though a few played in 4♠.

Dir: East ♠ A J 7 6 5 3
Vul: E-W ♥ A 7 3
♦ Q 3
♣ 7 3

♠ 8 4
♥ K J 8 6 2
♦ A 8 7
♣ A 8 6

If spades and hearts are 3-2, the ♥Q and ♦K onside and the same hand long in both majors, it would seem that either game is due to succeed. What could go wrong?

Imagine the play on a diamond lead. The ♦Q holds – good! Now you could go all out for setting up spades, but it looks rather better to take two ruffs in dummy and try to hold your trump losers to one.

So, after winning the ♦Q at trick one, you duck a club, win the club return and ruff a club, play the ♦A and ruff a diamond, cash the ♥A (West producing the 9), then the ♠A and lead a spade from dummy. East wins, leaving this end position (West unblocking the ♠Q):

When East plays a third spade, all you know about the trump suit is that to be in danger you will have to find West with the bare ♥Q or ♥10 left. Which is more likely? Restricted choice argues for the Q-9 being more likely than 10-9. So you ruff with the 8 . . . and, as you can see from the full deal, you have found the only way to go down!

Notice to players

Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.



Entry fees

Players must be ACBL members whose service fees or dues are current in order to compete in any of the following nationally ranked events: Nail Life Master Open Pairs, Smith Life Master Women's Pairs, Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams, Keohane North American Swiss Teams, Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs, Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams, Marsha May Sternberg Women's Board-a-Match Teams, the Senior Mixed Pairs, the Super Senior Pairs and the Baze Senior Knockouts.

The entry fees for these contests are \$20 per player per session.

Players must also be current ACBL members to play in the Mini-Blue Ribbon Pairs, Manfield Non-Life Master Pairs and National 99er Pairs. The entry fee is \$17 per player per session.

Regional championships are \$16 per player per session for ACBL members, \$18 for non-members.

All other events are \$15 per player per session for ACBL members, \$17 for non-members.

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

After the Transfer

In a recent class on Jacoby transfers, I noticed this auction at Jane's table:

Opener	Jane
1NT	2♦ (1)
2♥	3♥

(1) Transfer to hearts.



Jane started with five hearts and an invitational-strength hand, so I had expected her to rebid 2NT. Jane had made an error I often see in my transfer lessons: She heard the opener bid hearts and thought they were agreeing to

play in them. Jane forgot that she *told* opener to bid 2♥!

I asked Jane, "How many hearts do you promise when you transfer?" She looked at her cards and started to answer, but I continued, "I'm not asking how many you *have*, I'm asking how many your partner *expects* you to have."

"Opener knows I have at least five hearts," she correctly answered.

I put the following auction on the whiteboard:

Opener	Responder
1♥	1♠
2♥	

I asked the class, "In this auction, opener showed five hearts with his first bid, so how many should he have when he rebids the suit?" Class: "Six!"

"Exactly!" I said. We try never to freely rebid a five-card suit. The same logic applies to transfers. With only a five-card suit, responder cannot be sure of an eight-card fit (the 1NT opener may only have a doubleton). If she's strong enough to take a second

bid, responder should give opener the option of playing notrump.

Here are two charts we use to help clarify this for our students:

With a 5-card major

Responder's Strength	Rebid After transfer
0-7 (minimum)	Pass
8-9 (invitational)	2NT
10+ (game going)	3NT

With a six-card major suit there's a guaranteed fit with the opener, so the transferor will stay in the suit, rebidding them after the transfer:

With six or more in a major

Responder's Strength	Rebid After transfer
0-7 (minimum)	Pass
8-9 (invitational)	3♥ or 3♠
10+ (game going)	4♥ or 4♠

Note that with minimum strength (0-7) responder will transfer and then just pass. If there's no chance of game, stop bidding! It's only with invitational (8-9) or game-going (10+) values that he takes another bid.

One student asked, "How will I know when it's right to transfer and pass (with a weak hand) when I only have *five* cards in my major? Shouldn't I pass and let partner play 1NT if I'm not sure of an eight-card fit?"

My advice: Always transfer. Yes, it might be only a seven-card fit, but it *could* be that opener has three, four or even five cards in your major. If you guess every time, you might wind up zigging when you should be zagging. Besides, *you* won't have to play it!



Another question I frequently hear is: "Do I really need transfers?"

If you or your partner simply don't want to play Jacoby transfers, you would still be able to play a fine game of bridge. It's not a requirement. However, many of your opponents *will* be playing Jacoby transfers and it would behoove you to understand *their* bidding. I personally play this convention and believe any serious partnership would benefit from using it. In my opinion, you gain more than you lose.

Thinking bridge

Opening lead: ♠Q

Bidding commentary: West has a minimum weak two — 6 high-card points, but compensating values (a strong suit with three honors). As South, doubling 2♠ and then bidding 3NT is stronger than bidding 3NT directly. Even so, with a 22-count, you may have a little "left-over" feeling.

Defensive commentary: As East, overtake the ♠Q with the ♠A to avoid blocking the suit and return a spade to drive out the ♠K. The defense is off to a good start.

Play commentary: As South, the bidding and East's play at trick one mark East with a doubleton spade. The idea of a holdup play is not necessarily to win the third round of a suit. The idea is to take the trick when the player with shortness is playing her last card in the suit. East is marked with two spades, so win the second spade. If you can't be sure whether the opponent with shortness has two or three cards, win the third round of the suit. Finally, if one opponent is marked with a singleton, it is safe to win the first round of the suit. It really is.

Play commentary #2: As South, after winning the second spade, count your sure tricks. You have one spade, one heart, two diamonds and four clubs for a grand total of eight. You can always try the heart finesse, but that finesse goes into the danger hand, West, the hand with winning spades galore. A better idea is to keep the danger hand off lead by working with diamonds and finessing into the non-danger hand, East — the one who has no more spades. Cash three top clubs and lead a diamond to the 9. After this loses, win the heart return with the ace, cross to the ♦K noticing West show out, cash the ♣J, discarding a heart, and lead a diamond to the 10. The ♦A is your ninth trick. Your 22 HCP were barely enough to bring this baby home. A simple rule of thumb is to aim all finesses into the non-danger hand.

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Seamon-Molson passes 15,000 masterpoints



With her lucky 13th North American championship – the Marsha May Sternberg Women’s Board-a-Match Teams at this tournament – Janice Seamon-Molson now has more than 15,000 masterpoints.

A full-time player, Seamon-Molson has two world championships to her credit – the Venice Cup in Monte Carlo in 2003 and the McConnell Cup in Verona, Italy, in 2006. She also has silver medals in the Venice Cup (Bermuda, 2000) and the World Women’s Teams, then known as the Women’s Olympiad Teams (Istanbul, Turkey, 2004), plus bronze medals in the World Women’s Teams (Beijing 2010) and the World Women’s Pairs in Verona.

Seamon-Molson is mother to 13-year-old Jennifer, who on Saturday was taking part in a thespian competition back home in Florida. “I’m waiting to hear how she does, so I’m a little nervous,” Seamon-Molson confessed.

The following deal was played by Seamon-Molson and German star Sabine Auken at the 1993 Fall NABC in Seattle.

As happens so often with event winners, the two were playing in a women’s event for the first time, on this occasion the Smith Life Master Women’s Pairs. They won the four-session event by more than five boards.

They found their way to a slam that few reached on this deal:

Staying awake

It is never easy to match wits with Steve Weinstein. Here’s your chance. You are West.

Dlr: North ♠ A J 9 4
Vul: E-W ♥ Q 8 4
♦ A K 6

You lead a trump and partner plays the 10. Declarer wins in hand, unblocks the ♦Q, cashes the ♣A and ♣K and crosses to a trump. Now he cashes the top diamonds, pitching clubs, and ruffs a club, then leads a low heart from hand. Do you win or duck?

This was the end position at which you had to pick your play:

If you play low to protect partner’s ace, declarer can also duck. Your partner will be able to win and cash the ♥A but must then give a ruff-sluff to concede the overtrick (declarer ruffs in hand and discards dummy’s third heart, leaving dummy with only high trumps).

Your best defense in this case is to play the ♥J to cover this position. The full deal:

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

It’s better to be lucky

This deal from the first day of Keohane North American Swiss Teams helped the squad captained by William Watson take the lead after two qualifying sessions. The all-California team is Watson, William Harker, Yul Inn, Cheryl Mandala, Bruce Noda and Mark Ralph.

The contract at both tables was 6♠. At our table, North was declarer. East started with the ♥8, and declarer, Inn, put in the jack, winning the king when West covered. Declarer cashed the ♠A and played a spade to the king, then cashed the top two clubs before ruffing a club in hand. Inn played a heart to dummy and ruffed the third heart, breathing a sigh of relief when East showed out but could not overruff.

Despite all the luck, declarer realized he was in trouble because East at that point was known to have six diamonds, and declarer was stuck in his hand.

Inn played a low diamond from hand, and East could have defeated the contract by winning and, perforce, playing a second round, which would have promoted West’s ♠J to the setting trick. Instead, East played low! When dummy’s singleton diamond held, Inn was able to pull West’s trump and claim an overtrick.

But wait – there’s more!

At the other table, South was declarer. West started with a low heart, which ran around to the jack. Declarer decided to go after diamonds instead of clubs, entering dummy with a heart to the king before playing the ♦J. East, apparently thinking South was void in diamonds, played low.

Declarer at that point was cold for 13 tricks, but he tried to cash the ♥A before drawing all the trumps, allowing East to ruff and play a second diamond to promote the setting trick in trumps.

With the ♦A Q sitting over the ♦K J, neither team took a diamond trick!

Monitoring

At this and future North American Championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants’ behavior, ACBL has another source of information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. Please summon a director if a problem occurs at the table.

This procedure is intended to assure everyone that the playing field is level and that misbehavior will not be tolerated.

Electronic Device Policy

1. For all NABC+ rated events at NABCs: Electronic devices, including but not limited to, phones, cameras, PDAs, and others capable of sending or receiving electronic communication are excluded from the playing areas during any session of play. This does not apply to health-related equipment.



2. For all events at an NABC other than a NABC+ rated event: Except for health-related equipment, or by permission of the Director-in-Charge of the tournament, cell phones, audible pagers or similar equipment may not be operated or operable in any manner in the playing area during a session of play. Any such equipment must not be visible during the session. Sponsoring organizations of other ACBL-sanctioned events are encouraged to adopt a similar policy.

3. These restrictions in numbers 1 and 2 above apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, play recorders (except those designated by ACBL) and kibitzers and are in force throughout any actual playing session or segment of play.

4. A violation of any of the restrictions in numbers 1 and 2 above will result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense will result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team. Kibitzers violating this policy will be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

Over Edwards' simple raise, Hoberman invented a bid - 2♠ - as a game try that worked out well for her in the play.

West led the ♦10, taken by Hoberman with the ace in hand. She played the ♥A and a heart to the king, pleased to see the suit break 2-2. She then cashed the ♦K and ruffed a diamond, then followed with the ♠8 from hand.

West, no doubt expecting Hoberman to play the queen and anticipating future spade tricks, played the ♠6. To everyone's surprise, Hoberman played low from dummy. East had to play the king, setting up dummy's ♠Q to win a later trick, and she brought home the seemingly impossible game, losing only two spades and a club.

King ruffed the second round of clubs and led the ♠Q. With this type of layout, it is imperative to lead high from the hand with one honor to protect against the very situation that existed here - all four trumps with West. King continued with the ♠10, covered by the jack and won with the king.

It is not too common to finesse in a suit where you have no natural loser, but King was thinking about the whole hand - what was he going to do with all his diamonds? - chances were that he was going to find all five on his right. So he took a heart finesse. Next he picked up trumps by finessing to the 8 and then cashing the ace.

He led the ♦Q, covered by the king and won with the ace - and sure enough, East had all the diamonds. King cashed the ♥A, pitching a diamond, and ruffed a heart, drawing the last non-diamond card from East. Now he led a diamond toward his 7, and East was helpless. She won with the 9, but then had to lead away from the 10-6 into the J-8.

Seattle 1993: Vintage Bergen

As a player, Marty Bergen was known for living on the edge. Fortunately for his partners and teammates, he knew what to do when he was in a tight spot. From the 1993 Seattle NABC, here is Bergen in action. He was playing with Walter Johnson.

It's unusual to land in game when your side enters the bidding on a balancing action, but Johnson's hand improved immensely when Bergen bid 3♥ freely. Bergen justified his partner's confidence by making the 18-point game.

West led the ♦J and continued with a diamond, ruffed in dummy. Bergen played the ♥K and ♥A, took the spade finesse and cashed the ♠A, pitching a club from his hand. Next he ruffed a spade and played a club to the 10. When East ducked, Bergen ruffed another spade, ruffed his last diamond and ruffed a spade for his 10th trick. The defenders took the ♣A and the high trump at tricks 12 and 13.

Even if he had gone down, Bergen's team was going to win IMPs on the board. At the other table, Bergen's teammates reached 3NT with the East-West cards. North led a heart, won by South, and on the heart return, West guessed to put in the 10. Plus 400 and plus 420 amounted to a 13-IMP gain.

My pass over the takeout double is a little-known tactic that often pays off. Let the opponents bid the major - or if your left-hand opponent bids 2♣ and it is passed back to you, you can bid 2♥, showing five hearts and four spades. If you didn't have that holding, you would have bid 1♥ directly over the double.

After my double, Muriel made a good disciplined pass, which is what I like to hear when I make a penalty double. Does your partner pull your juiciest doubles? In any court in the land, that's justification for homicide.

He stole, he lied and was kicked out of school. He remembers the day in 1963 when President John Kennedy was shot in Dallas. Everyone at his high school was sent back to their home rooms. In Jacobs' room, he started a poker game. "I was expelled," he recalls.

Jacobs has slept in doorways and in cars, and he once spent two years sleeping every night on a friend's couch.

While living in Washington DC and working as a driver for a medical company, he bluffed his way past the police during a riot so that he could get to a poker game in a burning building.

"I wasn't functioning like a human being," he says.

He remembers to this day when his life changed for the better – and for all time.

On May 12, 1974, he had bet everything he had – "actually, more than I had" – on the Milwaukee Bucks, playing at home in game seven of the NBA final against the Boston Celtics. The Bucks lost, and the next day, Jacobs was sitting at his desk at work as an accountant for Bell & Howell when he snapped.

"I just put my head on my desk and started crying," Jacobs recalls. "I was sick and tired of being sick and tired." A co-worker asked what was wrong, and when Jacobs described his troubles, the co-worker gave him the phone number for a local chapter of Gamblers Anonymous.

Jacobs, who had been kicked out of his house by his wife at the time, called GA the next day, but not with good intentions. "It was a con," he says. "I was just trying to get back into my house."

Jacobs was surprised at what he found at the meeting. "Something happened," he says. "I discovered that the other guys at the meeting were just like me, and I was just like them."

Jacobs has not made a bet in 37 years, and he attends Gamblers Anonymous meetings once a week when he is home.

These days, Jacobs spends time running the limousine company he founded in 2006, having sold his original limo company in 1998, staying on with the business for seven years. He retired in 2005, but that lasted only six months. Stacy, he recalls, told him one day, "Do something!"

Now working harder than ever but enjoying it even more, Jacobs somehow finds time to contribute to the Bridge Bulletin faithfully. "I write the columns late at night," he says.

Jacobs says he was inspired to write the whimsical George's World because he thought the Bridge Bulletin could use a bit of humor, and he enjoys the feedback from readers.

"Bridge is so great," he says. "I've gotten so much out of the game that I want to give back."



Youth renaissance not new to veteran Hamman

These days, young players seem to have captured the imagination of many in the world of bridge.

On Thursday night, 24-year-old Roger Lee and 29-year-old Josh Donn won the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs by more than two boards. In October, a team with most members in their 20s, including Player of the Year contender Joel Wooldridge, earned a silver medal in the Bermuda Bowl.

There are good young players wherever you look.

Hall of Famer Bob Hamman is one who appreciates the talents of some of the young Turks. "They're good," he says. "They've got energy and ability. The only bad thing is that there aren't enough of them."

Hamman also has another footnote for bridge historians: What's going on now is not really new.

"It's nothing different," he says, noting that when he and Don Krauss came from nowhere in 1963 to win the trials and make the U.S. international team, they were, respectively, 25 and 26 years old.

Paul Soloway, another Hall of Fame player, was only 24 and making his mark – and there were other young players of that time who would go on to glory: Peter Weichsel, Alan Sontag, Lew Stansby, Mike Lawrence, Billy Eisenberg and Bobby Goldman, to name a few.

Among those now destined for stardom, at least in Hamman's view, are Joe Grue, John Hurd, Wooldridge and Justin Lall. The latter, says Hamman, has been exceptional for nearly a decade. "It's close between Justin or Kyle Larsen for who was best at a young age."

(1) 2♣ was not Alerted during the auction.

North noted the failure to Alert before the opening lead.

Facts: East called the director at the end of the auction. He told the TD privately that he would have doubled an Alerted 2♣ bid but felt he could not ask about an unAlerted 2♣ bid without passing unauthorized information to West. North had told East-West at the start of the round that they play "strong notrump and a rubber bridge style." East felt that this made it plausible that North-South were not playing Drury.

After the opening lead of the ♣6, South made 12 tricks in 4♠ for plus 480.

Director's Ruling: The ACBL Alert Procedure states that "Players who, by experience or expertise, recognize that their opponents have neglected to Alert a special agreement will be expected to protect themselves." The ACBL Club Director's Handbook says, "Note that an opponent who actually knows or suspects what is happening even though not properly informed may not be entitled to redress if he or she chooses to proceed without clarifying the situation." The director ruled that the table result stands since a seeded pair, such as East-West, should have the experience/expertise to protect themselves.

The Appeal: East-West appealed the director's ruling and North, South, East and West appeared at the hearing.

The Appealing Side: East paused for a few seconds in order to allow South to Alert 2♣. When he failed to do so, East judged that North-South were one of (in his opinion) many pairs who did not play Drury. East also felt that asking about 2♣ would bar a club lead if 2♣ wasn't Drury, and just feels awful. Furthermore, being required to ask puts his side in an untenable position; if he is wrong, that the opponents do not play Drury, then he can no longer get lucky and have his partner lead a club from, say, 109x.

The Committee Decision: North-South's agreement is that 2♣ was Drury. ACBL regulations require an Alert of Drury, so this was a failure to Alert, and therefore misinformation (MI). The non-

offending side (NOS) was clearly damaged by the MI. At most of the tables at which the committee played, Drury was doubled, a club was led, and a heart shift was found. Therefore, assuming that East was misinformed, reciprocal 450s are likely and nothing else is at all probable.

The difficult point is the regulations cited by the TD. The director ruled that Drury was common enough and that East's hand suggested that there was a failure to Alert, so East needed to protect himself by asking about 2♣.

This regulation also applies to West. Once South bid 4♠, West pretty much knew that 2♣ was Drury. Furthermore, he also knew that he could ask about 2♣ before he acted, and if there was a failure to Alert, his partner would get a second chance to act. The Appeals Committee judged that this would not occur to even one player in 100. Practically, requiring this sort of protection is not reasonable, so we judged that West did not have to protect the partnership. East, however, strongly suspected that 2♣ was Drury before he acted.

Is "strongly suspected" enough to require protection? A few years ago, a player held 22 high-card points and heard a Flannery opening and a jump described as "invitational." The Appeals Committee ruled that he knew from his hand and experience that the jump was meant as blocking, so he was on his own. That case was obvious---that player knew what was going on. A similar made-up example: a player holds 24 HCP and hears a 3NT opening on his right. No alert. He knows there should be one. If he doesn't ask to protect himself, he gets no protection.

So where is the line in the sand? Is "strongly suspects" a failure to alert enough? What if East had held:

x Q x x x x x A Q J 10 9 x?

Now he's pretty certain, but not 100% that 2♣ wasn't natural. Where are the spades? Is that sufficient to require that East protect himself?

Finally, we judged that "recognized" means "knows intuitively" as in "recognized at a glance," not just "strongly suspected." If, for example, the opponents open 1NT then bid 2♦, is that enough to assume that, if there was no announcement, 2♦ was a transfer? No. But when opener bids 2♥, then we think that should trigger the "did you guys fail to announce 2♦ as a transfer" question. Here, the jump to 4♠ makes it obvious that 2♣ was Drury, but 2♣ by itself is not enough to make it 100% obvious.

All in all, this is a very close case. On one hand, the offending side (OS) committed an infraction. That infraction damaged the NOS. The NOS was unwilling to ask a "bad" question for fear of compromising their rights. Equity is reciprocal 450s. On the other hand, the regulation could be interpreted to require that East protect himself. Most honest players, however, would not be willing to ask about an unalerted call here, so the Appeals Committee adjusted the score to 4♠ making 5, East-West plus 450.

Chronicles of a newbie

I am no longer a "newbie" in calendar years. I began bridge in 2005, so it would now be dishonest and sleazy to try to pass myself off as a new player, although I sometimes wish I could still use that excuse.

At tournaments where nobody knows me, I like to say I've been playing for two weeks. I've even thought about moving so that I could pretend to be a beginner somewhere else. When I started playing, I asked more experienced players how long it would take me to learn to play reasonably well. Almost to a person, they said, "five years." Now, when I ask them that same question, they say, "five ... er ... uh ... oh, ten years... or... oh... maybe even 15." So, to maintain honesty and pride, I call myself a "post graduate" newbie.

I do believe that I have learned some things in these last years. Perhaps I've gained a little more confidence, weep less at the bridge table. I am now starting to incorporate new conventions into my game but have discovered that the hardest part of a new convention is simply remembering it.

I have, once or twice, turned "unusual 2NT" into downright "weird 2NT." However, I have also created some conventions of my own.

I think it might interest other "newer" players to know these new conventions should they want to use them themselves. They are not yet copyrighted or named for me. This may change as they gain widespread use and popularity. The following includes an explanation of only the most logical. (I'm still perfecting several others):

Amnesia Convention: After you open and your partner bids, you forget completely what partner's bid means but do realize that it is a conventional bid from the look of rising horror on your partner's face as you just sit there... and sit there... and sit there. Obviously, you cannot Alert because you've forgotten what it means. So, in a display of brazen bravado, immediately ask for aces (using Gerber) while praying for an earthquake or an armed robbery. This excites (albeit puzzles) your partner and shuts out the opponents. The situation can be saved with some grace in about .0001% of the time.

Oyster Convention: With opening points and five of a major, open one of that major (as in Standard American) if you're playing during the months with an "r" in them. If you're playing during the "non-r" months (May, June, July, August) open one of a major if you are VOID in that major. This must be noted on your convention card, of course, and it is effective to have two different colors of ink (I use red and green for a festive look): one color for the "r" months and the other for the non-r months. It must be Alerted one-third of the time and

is successful three-quarters of the time, usually in the “r” months, for some reason.

Texas Two Step (aka Texas Stomp): You must have 0 to 25 points and cannot be the opener. This is a very simple convention. Always add two steps (hence the name) to whatever suit was bid previously (the same suit). For example: Opener bids 1♣, you bid 3♣. Opener bids 2♥, you bid 4♥; opener bids 3♠, you bid 5♠. It is simply a way of showing your partner your point count; it has nothing whatsoever to do with the suit bid, and must be Alerted. The troubling aspect of this convention is that if opponent opens 1NT, you are forced to jump to 3NT, which shuts your partner out.

With an opening of 1NT add two of either red suit, for example, 1 NT – 3♦ or 3♥. This has never been successful yet, but I am still fine tuning it.

Garden Path: This is the opener’s rebid after responder has bid a new suit and opponents have passed. Jump immediately to game in either of the unbid suits. Generally, your partner will mutter about being led down a garden path. This is not Alertable and is successful .05% of the time.

Saturday Night Relay (aka Saturday Night Special, aka introverted minors): Open with 1♠, showing that you want partner to bid 2♥. This must be Alerted. After responder’s bid of 2♥, opener bids 3♦, which must be Alerted, asking responder to bid 4♣. Responder must have the heart of a rhino to keep bidding, but he/she is obligated to bid 4♣ to keep the relay up and running. (Opener must Alert as a forcing bid.)

At this point, Opener bids six of the responder’s last bid (clubs). This forces the responder to play while the opener, as dummy, rushes from the room to attend an incipient nose bleed. This has been successful once in five years.

CILIG Convention (Coming in Last is Guaranteed): This is a rather rare convention, taking consummate nerve, and partners have to agree on certain aspects of its use, primarily agree not to strangle the other one either at the table or in private. It cannot be Alerted because one partner is always in the dark. It is simple: Opener cleverly passes with 15-plus high-card points. It is a sly ploy to see what the opponents will do with the aim of setting them. As much as 15% of the time you can hold your opponents to a one-level bid and feel smug.

Fractured (Variation on Splinter): With opening points, opener bids one of a suit to show a void in either the suit above or the suit below. This must be Alerted. For example, an opening bid of 1♦ shows a void in clubs or hearts (but not both – that is a different convention) but says nothing at all about diamonds. Responder then bids the unspecified suit, in this case spades (Alertable). Opener jumps to game in whatever suit he likes best. I haven’t calculated the success rate on this one because I always seem to slide back into Amnesia, but I do believe it has a certain innate elegance.

I know that these are somewhat complicated, and players must keep careful notations on convention cards, so as not to appear dimwitted or even mentally ill. I certainly do that. My convention card is the only one in the unit that has an index, footnotes, an appendix and a short bibliography attached to it.

Directors still find this difficult for some reason. One regularly mutters incoherently when called to my table; one laughs so hard that we can never understand the ruling; one stares in muted silence for so long that we fear apoplexy. Several have suggested that I move to southern France for my health. I am undaunted, though, and believe that I will prevail. Even now, I am preparing a guide to little-known discarding signals.

North led the ten of hearts. David Kendrick ducked and won the heart continuation with dummy's king. He led a spade up and South, having no reason to expect the actual spade position, grabbed his ace to clear the hearts. Kendrick won the heart ace and cashed the king of spades, seeing North pitch the queen of diamonds. He cashed the ace of diamonds then exited with the fourth heart. That squeezed South out of a club. North returned a club but Kendrick won the queen in dummy and cashed the king of diamonds and that squeezed South again. Forced to keep two spades, South gave up his club stopper and Kendrick had his overtrick.

Now, would that be a crucial trick, beating 4♠ making exactly at the other table, or would the other team's declarer time everything perfectly and make an overtrick in 4♠? The answer was neither! At the other table, West opened 2♣ and North pre-empted with 3♦. When West reopened with a double and East left it in, that was minus 1100. Kendrick's hard work proved to be completely irrelevant.

Incidentally, there was an alternative route to a tenth trick in 3NT. Instead of playing the fourth heart to squeeze South, declarer can simply cash his minor-suit winners then exit with the fourth club, forcing South to lead away from the ten of spades at trick twelve. It's just a matter of personal taste, squeeze or endplay.

Life Master news

Ken Imboden of San Jose CA earned his gold card earlier in the week playing in the Tuesday Rhododendron Pairs with Lynn Bartz of Campbell CA. Needing about 9 gold points to become a Life Master, Imboden and Bartz came through a third overall in the event to earn 10.77 gold.

Joan Borberg and her Portland OR team did well enough in the knockouts to get her over the top and make her a new Life Master. She needed only 1 gold point and, as of Saturday afternoon, was guaranteed more than 2 from her KO match. Borberg's partner is Ian Kirk, and their teammates are Virginia Sinclair-Brooks and Margi Costello Redden.

Norm Featherston Memorial Stratified 299er Swiss Teams

Norm served four years in the U.S. Air Force and then earned a B.S. in electrical engineering from the University of Washington. He worked for Boeing as an engineer for over 30 years until his retirement in 1991. While at Boeing, he spent much of his time training military personnel on missile operations.

During his college years, Norm made friends with Bob Weed. Their wives took bridge lessons and Jamie Weed (Steen) taught Norm how to play bridge. Thereafter, Norm and Bob became a successful partnership for years. Norm played with all of the best local players and had numerous regional wins, high finishes in NABC events, and represented District 19 in both the Grand National Teams and North American Open Pairs events many times.

Norm was one of the area's best bridge teachers and was always available to answer questions and mediate between partners. He had a special way of leading the players to the best solution without ever saying one or the other was wrong. With a great sense of humor hidden in a studious manner, Norm was always ready with a good story. Granddaughters Hannah and Rebecca Hensel were a great source of joy to Norm.

Steve Sidell Memorial Strati-Flighted Swiss Teams

Seattle native son Steve Sidell graduated from Franklin High School in 1965; then on to Occidental College in Los Angeles, where he obtained his B.A. in mathematics. While living in Southern California he was exposed to the Walsh or Western Scientific school of bidding, which he brought back to Seattle upon his return in the early 1970s.

Steve's pursuit and enjoyment of the game encompassed all aspects: playing, kibitzing, reading, teaching and discussing. He won numerous regional titles from 1968 until his death in 2009. He represented District 19 in Grand National Team competition multiple times.

He would travel to NABCs and world championships, play sparingly, kibitz frequently and enjoy the dining and tourist attractions at any and all venues. He once attended an NABC in New York City, and later disclosed he had not played a single session of bridge, but only kibitzed the major events. The truth be told, he had made dinner reservations weeks in advance at several notable restaurants. Steve did have his priorities, and the referenced week was not an isolated instance in his bridge-based travels.

In the last decade of his life, Steve directed much of his passion for bridge to teaching small groups throughout the greater Seattle area at senior centers, evening courses at local colleges or wherever

groups of students might be developed. Steve was an amazing teacher and was greatly admired by his students.

While using structured ACBL course materials, he was able to convey both why the bidding and carding methods were recommended, and how to think about the game on a larger scale. Steve would quote his close friend, Paul Soloway, that winning bridge – if it were a football game – is the result of good blocking and tackling, and does not depend on trick plays.

Shirley Opstad Memorial Stratified Open Pairs

Shirley graduated from the University of Washington, married Ed Opstad and shared the life of a career military man. While raising her four children, Shirley played bridge all over the country. The Opstad family moved to Texas where she had a great partnership with Colonel DeWitt Hudson.

After Ed's retirement, the Opstads returned home to live in Federal Way. She worked at Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center along with many other bridge players. Shirley had many successful partnerships while living in the Seattle area, and brought pleasure and grace to all she encountered at the table. Shirley was a woman small in stature but a tiger at the table.
