Bleish defends Robot title in squeaker



Bill Bleish, winner of the Fall NABC Robot Individual in 2023, successfully defended his title last weekend by the razor-thin margin of 0.01%. Bleish, of Lenexa KS, finished the three-day contest with a 70.13% score, holding off a challenge by Yauheni Siutsau of Loveland OH who finished with 70.12%.

Bleish scored 65.10% in the first session, good for 70th place, but he won the second session with a 73.30% set, bringing him to seventh place. A final

In B flights, no single player may be over 3000. In Gold Rush events, no single player may be over 750. **BOLD, UPPER CASE = NABC+ events.** UPPER CASE = NABC events. Green = Regional events (gold and red points). Blue = Gold Rush events (gold and red points). Red = Intermediate/Newcomer 299er events (red points).

session score of 72.00% was just enough for Bleish to win the event.


Runner-up Siutsau won the third session with an impressive 76.03% score, but his first two sessions were 63.99% and 70.34% respectively, making his three-day average just short of Bleish's.

In third was Italy's Andrea Boldrini who posted a 69.40% average.



Lei Tsui, of Thousand Oaks CA, was the top Flight B player with a threeday average of 64.31%, good for 26th place overall.

The best score by a Flight C player was turned in by Max Cheng of Toronto with a 64.17% effort and 30th place overall.

Tips for New Players By Frank Stewart

Plan, then play

When you're declarer, you can't act like Cy the Cynic, a denizen of my imaginary club. Cy plunges ahead, adopting the first line of play that occurs to



him. Cy maintains that his approach saves wear and tear on his brain, but he loses many makeable contracts.

Before you call for the first card, make a plan, beginning with a count of winners (often at notrump or at a low-level suit contract) or losers (often at a game or slam where, let us hope, you don't have many losers).

What would be your plan at this 4.

Many players would open as South, but you must draw the line somewhere. Though North has only three-card spade support, a raise to 2♠ was his best call. West leads the ◆J and a second diamond. East takes the ◆K and ◆A and leads a heart; your ace wins.

You have nine winners: five trumps, three clubs, one heart. If the missing clubs break 3–3, no problem: draw trumps and run the clubs. If clubs are 4–2, you can take the queen and ace, then ruff a club, and hope to draw all the trumps ending in dummy and take two more clubs. But that plan will fail if the trumps break 4–1.

Start with the A–K of trumps. If East–West follow, take the ♣Q, ♣A and ruff a club; if trumps break 4–1, draw trumps and rely on a 3–3 club break.

You will play many contracts that seem routine. Those require a second look:

South played at a dull-looking 4♠, and West led the ♥10. Declarer won with the king and cashed the ♠A ... and East discarded. Declarer led a second trump to dummy's 9, took the ♣K A, ruffed his last club and cashed the ♠Q, but then he was stuck in dummy. When he took the ♥A and ruffed a heart, West overruffed, and the defense took three diamonds.

It took care and foresight for South to correctly win the first trick with the VA. Plan, then play!



Entry fees

A valid ACBL player number is required to play in all events at the NABC.

For all daytime events, a discount of \$10 per player per session is available to registered guests of the host hotel and residents of the host district who purchase entries through Entry Express.

Players must be ACBL members whose service fees or dues are current in order to compete in any Premier NABC+, NABC+ or NABC events.

Premier NABC+ events are the Soloway Knockout Teams, the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs, the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams and the Keohane North American Swiss Teams. The undiscounted entry fees for these contests are \$50 per player per session. For team events, this means \$200 per team per session for four-person teams, \$250 per team per session for five-person teams, and \$300 per team per session for six-person teams. For the four-session Swiss stage of the Soloway KO, the total undiscounted entry fee is \$150 per player.

NABC+ events are the Nail Life Master Pairs, Mitchell Open Boarda-Match Teams, Super Senior Pairs, Whitehead Women's Pairs, NABC+ Mixed Pairs and NABC+ Mixed Swiss Teams. The undiscounted entry fees for these contests are \$45 per player per session. For team events, this means \$180 per team per session for four-person teams, \$225 per team per session for five-person teams, and \$270 per team per session for six-person teams.

Note: \$1.50 per person per session benefits the International Fund for all of the above events.

NABC events are the 0–6000 Mini-Blue Ribbon Pairs, the 0–10,000 Swiss Teams, the 0–10,000 IMP Pairs, the 0–10,000 Fast Pairs, the 0–2500 Pairs and the 0–6000 Pairs. The undiscounted entry fee is \$35 per player per session. For the team events, this means \$140 per team per session for teams of four, \$175 per team per session for teams of five, and \$210 per team per session for teams of six.

Regional events are \$32 per player per session for current members without discount, \$37 for inactive members. For team events of one or two sessions, the entry fee is \$128 per session regardless of the number of team members. Evening events are \$22 per player per session.

Events with a limit of 300 masterpoints or lower are \$28 per player per session for current members without discount, \$33 for inactive members.

Regional events held at 5 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 28, are \$36 per player for current members without discount. For these events, \$4 per player per session benefits the ACBL Educational Foundation.

Nail Life Master Pairs begins today

Play begins today in the Nail Life Master Pairs. The event, restricted to Life Masters, consists of two qualifying sessions and two final sessions.

Before 1963, the event was restricted to National Masters and players of higher rank. It was a men's



event until 1990, when it was changed to an open event.

At stake is the Bobby Nail Trophy, designated by the ACBL Board of Directors to honor the diminutive Texan (1925–95) who won this event in 1974 with longtime friend and partner Gerald Michaud.

Nail, inducted into the Bridge Hall of Fame in 2001, won four other North American championships and represented North America twice in the Bermuda Bowl. His team was second in 1963.

Soloway KO starts today

The Soloway Knockout Teams gets underway today. The top-tier contest begins with a two-day Swiss qualifying round, reducing the field



to 32 squads, followed by five days of head-to-head knockout matches to produce a single winner.

The contest awards platinum points, which are even available from match awards in the Swiss qualifier.

The Soloway KO concludes on Thursday, so that it does not conflict with the venerable Reisinger Boarda-Match Teams, which begins the following day.

The contest is named in honor of late Hall of Famer Paul Soloway (1941–2007), who was the all-time ACBL masterpoint leader until his death. Soloway was the winner of

five Bermuda Bowls and 31 North American championships. In 2001 he was the first recipient of the Sidney Lazard Jr. Sportsmanship Award.

The Soloway KO debuted in San Francisco in 2019.



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Robot recap

Bill Bleish, whose BBO screen name is "78jayhawk," successfully defended his title as Fall NABC Robot Individual winner this week (see pg. 1) and provided the following deals about the three-day online event.

On Day 1, I had a solid game with only two minus boards and not many chances to improve upon my score. The boards were pretty flat, and I only had one board above 85%. I was in 70th place.


On Day 2, I was dealt a monster! Nine of my 24 boards were above 90%. Unfortunately, I also had some screw-ups and gave away about 6% of the matchpoints. Nevertheless, I was the top overall scorer and moved up to seventh place. At that point, I knew I was in contention for the title.

Day 3 was another big game. Half of my boards were 85% or higher. At the end, I was just trying to get to the finish line, and so I was maybe too conservative, missing some games and a couple slams. I kept thinking, everything can't be going this well: I am bound to get some bad breaks or finesses that are off – but it never happened!

It is such a thrill to win a second time against a field of world-class players and experts at the Robot game. I am a golfer and I would compare these NABC Robot Individual wins like having a hole-in-one in golf. It takes skill but also a lot of luck, which was certainly the case for me!

Here are a couple of hands that went my way.


From session two, I was pleased to find the right play on this one to gain a valuable overtrick and a 96.2% score:



In the auction, my 3♦ bid was an attempt to get to 3NT if partner had a spade stop. When he bid 4♣, I was close to going to game but decided to not push it.

After a spade lead and continuation, I ruffed low. Needing


some diamond ruffs from dummy, I cashed a high diamond. West played the ◆9 which looked a little suspicious, so I decided to go to the table with a high trump and lead a diamond from the board. East ruffed, but it was on air, as West followed. I ruffed the spade continuation high and ruffed my losing diamond with the remaining high trump in dummy. I pulled West's remaining trumps with my two top clubs. At this point, I had a complete count on the hand. East was 6–4 in the majors, and my last trump winner squeezed him in the majors, eliminating my heart loser. Here's the position as I played my last trump:



On the ♣J, West let go of a diamond, and I discarded a low heart from dummy. East could safely pitch one low heart, but the ◆K was next, and it was the nail in the coffin for East.

Making five was worth 96%, and I didn't have to risk bidding game for that result!

Here is the next-to-last deal for me on Day 3:




On the surface, this looks like a pretty mundane partscore hand, but at matchpoints, overtricks are everything.

East led the ♦Q and somewhat strangely, West followed with the 10. I decided to try and find a parking space for my losing club and led a low spade at trick two. East ducked and West won the ace over dummy's queen. West returned a low diamond, I played the 8, East the jack, and I ruffed in dummy. I now led a low spade to the 10 and East's king. East shifted to a club, but too late!

I rose with the ace and cashed the ♠J, pitching my club. I then ruffed a club, West playing the 10. I ruffed a diamond, and West followed with the king. Now, my ◆9 was good, so I didn't need any more ruffs!

This was the position:



I cashed the ♥A and East followed with the queen. I was now at the crossroads. I know about restricted choice, but I am more about making the right play on the information available on the given hand. Neither opponent had bid, and it looked like East had the ♣K because West ducked the second club from the table rather than flying up with the king. Also, West didn't shift to the ♣K at trick three, so he probably didn't start with the ♣K Q 10. East hadn't bid 2◆ with five diamonds and at least 11 points (assuming he has the ♣K) and hadn't doubled either, so he probably didn't have four spades but could easily have four clubs.

I knew I had to get this right or I would just give back the trick I had "stolen"! After agonizingly going through all the possibilities, I decided to take the heart finesse against the jack. It won, and I had a cold top for making five. Making four would also have been a very good score but would have put me in second place and not first!



ACBL NABC+ Ethical Behavior Policy

This policy is dedicated to maintaining the highest ethical standards at ACBL's premier NABC+ events (Vanderbilt, Spingold, Soloway, Reisinger, three-day open pair and Swiss events). Participation signifies an agreement to abide by these standards, promoting fairness and respect across all games.

Understanding the Ethical Behavior Policy: Violations and Penalties

The ACBL is dedicated to ensuring a fair and ethical playing environment at our premier NABC+ events. To achieve this, we have established clear guidelines on what constitutes unethical behavior and the penalties for such violations.

Potential violations include:

- Blatant or Repeated Use of Unauthorized Information in violation of Law 72C1: Taking advantage of any actions, including tempo breaks or other means, that could convey information not legally available to a player.
- Willful or Repeated Failure to Disclose in violation of Law 40A1b: Under-disclosing information about methods
- All potential violations will be recorded for analysis and future reference.

Our policy is designed to penalize but also to educate and prevent future unethical behavior. The aim is to foster an environment where fair play is at the heart of every game. We encourage all participants to familiarize themselves with these rules to avoid any misunderstandings or missteps during the competition. More detailed information on the Ethical Behavior Policy is available on our website, and we

By clearly communicating both the potential violations and their consequences, the ACBL can ensure that participants are well-informed and can contribute to a fair and enjoyable competitive atmosphere.

Reporting and Investigation

Director Calls, Camera Evidence, Player Reports: Suspected unethical behaviors observed by directors or captured on camera, and reports received from players, will be directed to the Player Integrity Panel (PIP).

Anonymity in Investigation: The PIP will assess the evidence without knowledge of the players' identities. Direct communication between players and the PIP is not permitted.

Decision Process

The application of any penalties under this policy requires a unanimous PIP decision.

Penalties:

First Offense: The player receives a warning, emphasizing the importance of ethical play, and the incident is documented.

Second Offense: One-year probationary period and a loss of seeding points. A violation during the probationary period incurs a minimum one-year suspension from NABC+ events.

Third Offense: Mandatory one-year suspension from NABC+ events and an additional loss of seeding points.

Additional Offenses: More severe penalties to be imposed.

Right to Appeal

Decisions made by the PIP can be appealed. An independent panel made up of regular high-level event participants will review appeals to ensure fairness.

Waiver and Acknowledgment

The captain of each team or one partner in pairs games must electronically sign a waiver acknowledging the ethical policy. Entry fee payment may be used as acknowledgment of the policy's terms and conditions.

Policy Review and Amendment

The policy will undergo regular reviews and updates to ensure it remains relevant and effective in promoting ethical play at ACBL NABC+ events.

Limited events eligibility

Players who have previously won an NABC+ event are not eligible to participate in any event with an upper masterpoint limit, including 0–10,000 events.


Selby's accuracy

"Plus 50," I called out on the last board of our desperately close Round of 32 match in the Soloway Knockout Teams in Atlanta.

"Ten to us," responded Selby, "we win the match by 6!" He'd kept a running total to avoid the necessity of our adding up the IMPs at the end.

"Wait a moment." I was puzzled. "Did they not lead a heart on that last board?" The deal was:



The auction had been the same at both tables:

West	North	East	South
1♦	2 ♣	2♥	4♠
All Pass			

At our table, I'd led a heart. Declarer had won with his ace and played a trump. I'd won, led a heart to Basil and his diamond shift had rendered the contract one off for plus 50. It had seemed pretty routine.

"They did indeed lead a heart."

"But you can't make it on a heart lead: if you duck, they win and switch to a diamond; if you win, they have a heart entry for a later diamond play," I inadvisably replied.

"Perhaps you ought to be more accurate. That is to say, others (he looked directly at me as he said this) could not have made it. To me, on the other hand, on the lie of the cards, it was very makeable." Selby had, not for the first time, both denigrated my bridge ability and impugned my proficiency with the language.

"I saw at once that to duck the heart would have been fatal with the ◆A almost certainly offside. Similarly, winning with the ♥A and playing on trumps would lead to, as you suggested, a heart continuation and a diamond through my king. Channelling one of my heroes, I reasoned that, 'Once you eliminate the impossible, whatever remains, however improbable ..." Truly, the man was insufferable sometimes.

"Clubs were what remained; if I played the ace and ruffed one, even if the king fell, I could not get back to the dummy in time for a discard on the jack; and playing low to the queen was hopeless, even in the unlikely event that it won.

What other alternatives could there be?"

Invoking Conan Doyle and Socrates in the analysis of a single deal was over the top, even for Selby. As ever, I was the straight man, even if a little impatient: "Tell us."

"The only possibilities that remained were that the K was doubleton (with West, of necessity) or that clubs were 3–3. In that case, there were two options for me:

- (i.) I could play the ace and a low club, discarding a heart, and if West had the doubleton king, the jack would be set up for a discard and East could never get in;
- (ii.) If I played the ♣A, then the jack, discarding my heart loser, 3–3 clubs would see me home. I'd have the trump entries to dummy to ruff out the clubs and return to the established ones.

"I thought about the distribution and the lack of any further bidding from East–West. Either opponent might have bid more, either with a spade void or with four-card support for partner, so I put the spades at 1–1, and hearts and diamonds each at 6–3, since either opponent might also have bid on with his own seven-card suit. I decided that, on balance, West was most likely to be 1=3=6=3."

"When I played the ♣A at trick two and followed with the queen, West contributed the 10, seeing my plan and hoping to deflect me from it. But, persisting with my decision about West's shape, I continued with the ♣J to West's king, discarding my heart loser. West persevered with a heart, but I ruffed and led a trump. With two entries to the dummy, I was able to ruff a club, setting up the suit, to make my contract. West cashed the ♠A and led another when in with the ♠A, holding me to 10 tricks and his loss to 10 IMPs."

"I must say, that was very impressive."

"Finally, an accurate statement!"
