Take All Your Chances

North (Dummy)

^ 7

♥ K J 6 4

♦ Q 8 7 3 2

♣ A Q 5

South (You)

♠ A 6 2

9 9

♦ A K J 9 6 5

♣ 643

You open $1 \spadesuit$, partner responds $1 \heartsuit$, East overcalls $1 \spadesuit$, you try $2 \spadesuit$, and West jumps to $3 \spadesuit$, preemptive. Partner has heard enough and leaps to $5 \spadesuit$, the final bid.

West leads a disconcerting \clubsuit J. Plan the play. (Diamonds are 1–1.)


You are looking at two possible club losers plus the ♥A. If West has underled the ♣K, there is no compelling reason to insert the queen. If you take the trick with the ace, you can always take a second trick with the queen later by leading up to it. The play of the ace prevents East from winning the king and returning a club, setting up a second club winner before a heart winner can be established for a club discard. Given the bidding, it is surely the proper play, but the hand isn't over yet.

One plan is to win the \clubsuit A, cross to a diamond and lead a heart to the jack. If this drives out the ace, the \blacktriangledown K can be used to discard a club. Even if the \blacktriangledown J loses to the queen, you have enough dummy entries to trump two hearts hoping to flush out the \blacktriangledown A.

But there is even a better plan. Win the A, strip the spades using the trump suit as communication (i.e., play the

♠A, ruff a spade in dummy, cross back to your hand with a trump, ruff your last spade, and come back to your hand with a trump), and then lead a heart to the jack. Say it loses to the queen. If East has the expected ♥A, East is cooked, as any return presents you with the contract.


The full deal:



The key play is the A at trick one, but notice West's top-of-sequence club lead rather than leading partner's suit. Holding a weak hand with a big fit in partner's suit, this may be West's last chance to be on lead. It is imaginative and often productive to lead from an honor sequence rather than partner's suit, particularly when it is likely one opponent has a singleton in the suit that you and partner have been bidding madly. If the J is not led, then the K is the recommended lead, as it may be important to hold the lead to make a killing shift if the king wins the trick.

Tip: It is an illusion to think you must always play the queen when dummy has A–Q–x–(x) and the suit is led. If you play the ace and later lead up to the queen, you still take a trick with the queen if the opening leader has led from the king. In the meantime, you are temporarily protected if fourth hand has the king. This play presumes you can afford to lose one trick in the suit.

DC area duo wins Young

Jichong Chai of Arlington VA and Haoyi You of Greenbelt MD won the three-day Young 0–3000 Pairs on Sunday by more than two and a half boards.

In Friday's qualifying round, Chai and You scored 64.42% and 55.40% to qualify in a somewhat distant second place. They dropped to fourth on Saturday with scores of 55.32% and 53.08% but came back strong on Sunday with 64.71% and 57.36%.

It's the first limited NABC win for the pair, who have been playing together for a year and a half.

"It's a very good experience for us," You said. "We are lucky."

In second were Daniel Murphy and Sharon Murphy of Indianapolis, who qualified in 48th place Friday and 31st on Saturday. A strong final with scores of 62.75% and 57.52% boosted them to second.

First- and second-day leaders Jackson Wahl and Sarah Wahl of Minneapolis fell to third, less than 2 matchpoints behind.

Minnesotans win Bruce

Andy Caranicas and Richard Lawson of the Minneapolis area won the Bruce LM–6000 Pairs on Sunday by nearly a board.

They got off to a slow start in Friday's qualifying sessions with 49.70% and 53.64% to qualify in 28th place, but took the lead on Saturday with scores of 59.23% and 63.77%. They capped it off with 57.84% and 53.66% in the final.

In second were Shelley Burns and Cindy Oishi of Vancouver BC, who qualified in 29th place, right behind the eventual winners, on Friday and moved to 21st place on Saturday. A big 62.31% in the first final session followed by 54.55% put them in second.

Caranicas and Lawson came to play in the Grand National Teams on District 14's Flight A team, so entering the Bruce was a bit of a consolation event for them. They won the GNT Flight B in 2010, and the previous year Caranicas played on a team that won the 0–1500 Spingold.

They have played together for 18 years, which has given them plenty of time to develop firm understandings. "We knew our system," Lawson said. "We had discussed every auction, every defensive situation that came up."

The three-day event is limited to those who have achieved the rank of Life Master but not gone over 6000 masterpoints.

Demuy has six NABC titles prior to this one, most recently the Norman Kay Platinum Pairs in 2023.

This is their first victory together. After qualifying 148th out of 156 pairs, they had some work to do. A 59.27% first final session got them up to 39th; their final session score of 69.56% brought their combined score to 2584.92, a little more than a board ahead of the second-place pair.

In second place were Troels Buus Thomsen and Signe Buus Thomsen, both of Denmark. "I think it's fun to play with family," said Signe, who was playing with her uncle.

They qualified in 32nd place and moved into second place with a 63.41% game in first final session. They hung on to that spot with a 55.09% second final.

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

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
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Beyond Bridge

Grand Adventures



Wagar Pairs starts today



Winners of last year's Wagar Women's Pairs: Marjorie Michelin and Kismet Fung

The Wagar Women's Pairs gets underway today. The event has been through several format and name changes; after decades as a knockout, it was run as a pairs contest for the first time in 2017. In some ways a relatively new event, it is tied to the history of the longest running women's event on the ACBL calendar.

Margaret Wagar (1902– 1990), inducted into the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame in 1999, became Life Master No. 37 in 1943, the fifth woman



to earn the rank. She and Kay Rhodes share one of the most remarkable achievements in ACBL history – they won the Women's Pairs four consecutive years: 1955, 1956, 1957 and 1958.

Wagar and Rhodes share another record – one of frustration. They were second in the Women's Teams for seven consecutive years, 1952–1958.

Wagar's impressive record spans three decades and includes wins in women's and open competition. Her open wins include the Reisinger in 1941, the Open Pairs (the forerunner of the Blue Ribbon Pairs) in 1947 and 1948 and the Spingold in 1946 and

1948.

Wagar served on the ACBL Board of Directors from 1960 to 1972 and was named ACBL Honorary Member in 1979. She was non-playing captain of the U.S. World Women's Teams in 1968 and 1972.

Before being named for Wagar, the event was contested for the Coffin Trophy.

Entry Express and purchase options

All monetary transactions are cashless, including entries for NABC and regional games. All major debit/credit cards are accepted wherever entries are sold.

Advance entries for events are available through the ACBL's online Entry Express system. It is necessary for eligible players to



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Spingold Knockout Teams

The Spingold Master Knockout Teams was originally known as the Masters Teams-of-Four, and it was first contested in September 1934 as a separate event held in conjunction with the Masters Individual. Although not played in 1935, it was again contested with the Masters Individual in 1936 and 1937. In 1938, the event became known as the Spingold Master Knockout Teams and was included in the summer schedule.

At one time the Spingold was a double elimination event scored by total points, usually lasting nine or ten sessions, restricted to players of Senior Master rank (100 or more masterpoints) and higher. Beginning in 1958, all matches were scored by IMPs (international matchpoints). In 1965, the double elimination method was replaced by three qualifying sessions (subsequently reduced to two), followed by single elimination knockout matches. The preliminary qualifying sessions were dropped in 1970.

The Spingold Trophy, donated by Nathan B. Spingold in 1934, is among the ACBL's most highly prized team trophies.

Spingold (1886–1958), a New York publicist, motion picture executive and patron of the arts, was one of the most influential men in bridge administration from 1937 to 1943.

Born in Chicago, he became a reporter on The Chicago Examiner, The Chicago Record Herald and The Chicago Tribune. Spingold's interest in show business brought him to New York City in the 1930s.

In 1932 he joined Columbia Pictures in a public relations capacity. He was named to the board of directors in 1940 and three years later took charge of advertising, publicity and development. He became a vice president of the company in 1954.

Active in bridge from its earliest days, Spingold was named ABL Honorary Member in 1936. He was instrumental in effecting a peaceful merger between the American Bridge League and the United States Bridge Association in 1937 and became president of the newly formed American Contract Bridge League the following year.

He served for many years on the League's Board of Governors and Board of Directors. Spingold was also president of the Cavendish Club in New York.

Zia's Double Squeeze

One great thing about playing in the major (and massive) national pair games is the chance to play against so many longtime friends and rivals. Yesterday, we got drilled by the legendary Zia Mahmood on the following deal. I was partnering Howie Weinstein and Zia was playing with almost-15-year-old bridge phenom, Brian Zhang of Dublin CA.

Check out Zia at the wheel in this 3NT contract, Board 25 of the second semifinal session:



After opening 2♠ in third seat, Zia made a takeout double. Howie passed and young Zhang contributed a constructive (playing lebensohl) 3♥. Zia rebid 3NT and Howie led a spade.

In less time than it takes to write these paragraphs, Zia won the ♠K in dummy, unblocked the ♥A Q, drove out the ♣A, cashed the ♠A and his three clubs and claimed on a double squeeze, reaching this ending:




With Howie, Zia's LHO, marked with the ♥10 (guarding dummy's 8) and me, on Zia's right, marked with the spade guard, it was apparent to Mahmood that the diamonds would run for the last three tricks.

Well done, Zia!

Double slam swing

Few things move the IMP needle in a team game more than a double slam swing. Carole Weinstein reported the following deal from the top bracket of Friday's Bracketed KO Teams where her squad picked up a huge 22 IMPs:



At one table, this was the auction:

On the ♥Q lead, declarer won, drew the outstanding trump and led a diamond to dummy. When South won the ace, declarer claimed. Plus 1540. Yes, South can defeat the contract by cashing the ♦A at trick one and giving North a ruff.

At Weinstein's table, this was the auction (she was South):

Weinstein decided the South hand was not a good candidate for a weak 2♥ opening, as the hand has first-round controls in diamonds and clubs, as well as three spades, making that strain playable opposite spade length.

6♠ doubled making – the defense can only take one heart trick – was worth 1660. Combined with the result from the other table, this was a total of plus 3200 which scores 22 IMPs.

Despite this excellent result, her team narrowly lost the match(!).

Weinstein played with Peter Stein and teammates Bob Gorsey and Neil Montague.



Convention card notice

Each player must have an ACBL convention card legibly filled out and on the table. The convention card must include the first and last name of each member of the partnership, and the cards must be identical. Please note that other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6-board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as they deem to be appropriate under the circumstances.

Whatever the meaning of 3 (perhaps minor suit Stayman or a transfer to clubs or simply forcing 3NT), North's 5NT was clearly pick-a-slam.

West led the ♥4, so declarer's hopes must have soared, but the club break meant two down, -100. The door was open.

Writing in The Acol Index, Eric Crowhurst pours scorn on the idea of opening 2NT on 20-point hands, let alone 19. It meant a flat board here, as it was in the other semifinal.

It would be a showdown Sunday for MINITER and ROBINSON.



ACBL kiosks

of these feetures. The simple screen


of these features. The simple screen displays three buttons for the most common uses. The home button will take you to the ACBL website.

There are five kiosks: two on the fifth floor, across from Salon H and between the doors for Salons D and E; two on the fourth floor, next to the ACBL Help Desk and in the corner outside Franklin A; and one on the third floor in the Liberty Ballroom foyer.

Navigating the Marriott and PCC

To get to locations in the HeadHouse Tower (Liberty Ballroom, Independence Ballroom), take the skywalk from the third floor of the Marriott and exit to the right. (If you are already in the HeadHouse Tower, take the elevator to the second floor.) Multi 2♦ Written Defenses

At the 2025 Summer NABC in Philadelphia, any pair playing the Multi 2 convention (where permitted[1]) must pre-Alert the opponents and provide two copies[2] of the ACBL written defense to the opponents prior to the start of a round. The opponents may refer to this defense (or to their own written defense) during the auction.[3] Details specified in the ACBL Convention Charts, effective date June 16, 2025.

Effective August 4, 2025, pre-Alerts are still required but written defenses for Multi 2•[4] may not be referenced during the auction at any permissible event[5] at a North American Bridge Championship tournament, including regional-rated events.

At all regional tournaments, when the convention is permissible[5], pre-Alerts and written defenses will be required to be provided and opponents may refer to them during the auction.[6]

- [1] Permissible events at the 2025 are Morehead GNT Championship Flight, Spingold KO Teams, Truscott/USPC Senior Swiss Teams, Roth Open Swiss Teams, 0–10,000 Mixed Swiss Teams, Top-Flight Swiss Teams and Open+ Chart brackets of Open Bracketed Round-Robin Teams only.
- [2] Extra copies are available by request (ask a tournament director).

- [3] Players are encouraged to refer to the written defense for every auction or none.
- [4] Written defense requirements for other conventions have not changed. This change applies to Multi 2D only.
- [5] Permissible events for future tournaments are described in the ACBL Convention Charts.
- [6] Applies to all regional tournaments (no district option to vary). Events where it is permitted must be at least six boards per segment and use the Open+ Convention Chart.

Eligibility points

Notice to members of other national bridge organizations: If you are currently a member of a bridge organization outside of USA, Canada, Mexico or Bermuda, or have been in the past, please be aware that you must have eligibility points assigned to you (or those previously issued to you reviewed, if more than a year ago) prior to participation in any event at this NABC. This is especially important if you intend to enter an event, flight or stratum with a masterpoint limit or a bracketed event. Please visit the Tournament Operations office (Room 405, fourth floor) for this purpose.



Entry Fees

A valid ACBL player number is required to play in all events at the NABC.

For all daytime events, a discount of \$10 per player per session is available to

1) ConferenceDirect-reserved registered guests of the host hotel; 2) other registered guests/roommates added through the EE form; and 3) residents of the host district or within 50 miles of the playing site who purchase entries through Entry Express.

Players must be ACBL members whose service fees or dues are current in order to compete in any Premier NABC+, NABC+ or NABC events.

Premier NABC+ events are the Grand National Teams (Championship Flight), von Zedtwitz Life Master Pairs, Spingold Knockout Teams and the Roth Open Swiss Teams. The undiscounted entry fees for these contests are \$50 per player per session. For team events, this means \$200 per team per session for four-person teams, \$250 per team per session for five-person teams and \$300 per team per session for six-person teams.

NABC+ events are the NABC+ Open Pairs, Wagar Women's Pairs, Truscott/USPC Senior Swiss Teams, Wernher Open Pairs, Freeman Mixed Board-A-Match Teams and the Oshlag Fast Pairs. The undiscounted entry fees for these contests are \$45 per person per session. For team events, this means \$180 per team per session for four-person teams, \$225 per team per session for five-person teams and \$270 per team per session for six-person teams.

Note: \$1.50 per person per session benefits the International Fund for all of the above events.

NABC event are the Grand National Teams (Flights A, B & C), the 0–6000 and 0–3000 Mini-Spingold Knockouts, the NABC 0–10,000 Pairs, the 0–10,000 Mixed Swiss Teams, the Bruce LM–6000 Pairs, the Young 0–3000 Pairs and the Bean Red Ribbon Pairs. The undiscounted entry fee for these events is \$35 per player per session. For the team events, this means \$140 per team per session for teams of four, \$175 per team per session for teams of five and \$210 per team per session for teams of six. (The GNT Flights A, B & C have no fee the first two days of the contest.)

Regional events are \$32 per player per session for ACBL members, and \$37 for inactive members. For team events of one or two sessions, the entry fee is \$128 per session. Evening events are \$22 per session.

Events with a masterpoint limit of 300 or lower are \$28 per player per session for ACBL members, \$33 for inactive members. Players with 0–5 masterpoints play free in I/N events on Friday, July 25.

Unless otherwise noted, strata breaks for all stratified events are: A (2500+), B (750-2500), C (0-750). Three-flight events are divided A/X (6000+/0-6000); B/C (1500-3000, 0-1500); Gold Rush (400-750/200-400/0-200). Two-flight events are divided A/X/Y (6000+/4000-6000/0-4000); B/C/D (1500-3000/750-1500/0-750) if no Gold Rush OR A/B/C (3000+/1500-3000/0-1500) and Gold Rush (400-750/200-400/0-200). In B flights, no single player may be over 3000. In Gold Rush events, no single player may be over 750. BOLD, UPPER CASE = NABC+ events. UPPER CASE = NABC events. International Fund

In NABC+ events, \$1.50 (per person, per session) of each entry fee will be allocated to the ACBL International Fund. These funds are used to underwrite part of the expenses of ACBL players who participate in international competition.
