When you play here in Philly, you may hear a few unfamiliar phrases at the table. These are Arnold-isms,

presumably conceived or at least brought to the local bridge lexicon by our own Arnold Selig, who is honored again today in the Friday–Sunday morning side game series. Here's a glossary to keep you up to speed.

- No jewelry? "Out of diamonds, partner?"
- Clubby: "Please play a small club from dummy."
- Schnitz: A hand where you take all 13 tricks.
- Whoop-de-doo hand: Makes the contract and then some, usually unbiddable.

- Nache: Rebidding your suit in a competitive auction.
- Tuna fish: A bid of 3♦.

According to legend, Arnold kept a can of tuna in his pocket. When he needed to make that bid, he'd skip the box, dig out the can and throw it on the table.

The management of the Marriott has announced that any players caught smoking or vaping in the stairwells of the hotel will be ejected from the property and issued no-trespass warnings.


Limited events eligibility

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

Sara DiVello's bridge story starts in a familiar way, with her family. "My parents taught my sister and me how to play bridge, and we were their partners. We played every night through the summers."

After a 30-year hiatus, Sara has returned to the game. "I have been wanting to restart for years," she said. "I love bridge. It is so fun. It is so fabulous. It's such good exercise for your brain."

She didn't know how to find her way back to the game. "I kept asking my

friends, 'Does anyone play bridge? Do you know anyone who plays bridge?' I couldn't find anyone."

Sara was not aware there was such a thing as the ACBL. "I wouldn't have thought that I would be good enough to be part of it," she said. "Because I'm still a beginning player."

Sara is an author who writes true crime. She was doing research and came upon a murder mystery that takes place in the world of bridge. "And so, I thought, OK, now it's time to do it, not



A possible layout:



Fate has propelled you into a 19-HCP game contract. Here's what happened: West opened 2♠, weak, passed around to you, and you balanced with 3♥. Partner can hardly be blamed for bidding 4♥, so there you are.

The opening lead is the **A**K. East overtakes and returns a spade to West

who plays a third high spade. Plan the play.

You can ruff with the ♥J, winning whenever West has the queen but losing when East has the queen. Or you can ruff with the king and run the jack, winning whenever East has the queen but losing whenever West has the queen. Is one appreciably better than the other? Is the Pope Catholic?

West started with six spades and has seven "other" cards. East started with two spades and has 11 "other" cards. Chances are that East, with 11 other cards, has the ♥Q. Ruff with the king and run the ♥J through East.

Tip No. 1: When you know the distribution of one suit (spades), but not any other, and are trying to work out which opponent has an important card in another suit, remember this: Length attracts shortness and shortness attracts length. (West has long spades and figures to have shorter hearts) East has short spades and figures to have longer hearts.)

Tip No. 2: When your right-hand opponent has a trump honor that can be finessed and dummy is void in trumps, all is not lost. If you can manage to reduce to the same trump length as your opponent, cash your side-suit winners, and then give up whatever loser(s) you may have. In the end, you will take two trump tricks. If you have no side-suit loser, arrange to end up in dummy at trick 11. No matter what you lead from dummy at trick 12, you will take the last two trump tricks.



Bay Area siblings win Youth Pairs

Brother and sister Jayson Lee and Katherine Lee of Hillsborough CA won the Baron Barclay National Youth Pairs on Friday by less than half a matchpoint.

They scored 60.32% in the morning session to qualify in ninth place, then 62.56% in the afternoon session. They had been leading handily with a round to go, but two blunders in the last round left them with a razor-thin margin. Their final score of 258.99 (a 66.41% average) was just 0.4 matchpoints ahead of Justin Cui and Xianzie Liu of China, who finished second.

Jayson, 13, learned bridge from his grandparents about seven years ago. They played no conventions, four-card majors, strong two-bids and wide-ranging notrump bids. The family would play with their grandparents once a week, but one week the grandparents weren't available, so their

"That's where they learned conventions," said Katherine, who turns 12 next week.

It was about four years ago when Katherine started getting into the game, taking classes on BridgeWhiz, a program of the ACBL Educational Foundation, during the pandemic. Later, when clubs started reopening, they attended both Silicon Valley Youth Bridge and Center for Bridge Education events. This is their first time winning something bigger than a SiVY competition.

The Lees recently played on the USA2 Under-16 team at the World Youth Teams Championship in Salsamagiorre, Italy. "We didn't do so well," Jayson said.

In the last round on Friday, Jayson held:

♦A K Q J 10 3 ♥6 5 **♦**K 9 **♣**Q 7 2.

His opponent opened 1♥ in second seat, and Jayson chose to double and then bid spades rather than overcalling. Because he had shown such a strong hand, Katherine raised him to game. They got doubled and went down three for a total zero. Another bad board followed, and they nearly lost their lead, but pulled through.

"We just like playing games to learn," Jayson said. "We're not playing to win."

Bridge in China from R to Z

The Youth NABC got a big boost in attendance this year when players from China attended for the first time since 2019. There are 30 of them here in Philadelphia.

One such group is RDFZ – 10 players from Ren Da Fu Zhong Middle School in Beijing. It's a very large school, combined with a high school: There are between 6000 and 7000 students in grades 6 to 12, said Chen Ziliang, a history teacher who coaches the RDFZ Bridge Association. The high school is affiliated with Renmin University of China and is one of the top schools in Beijing, Chen said.

At RDFZ, bridge is an elective course held Wednesdays and Fridays after school. There are about 200 kids in bridge, half of them newcomers. Those who came to the YNABC have mostly been playing two or three years. One pair – Zimo Hu, 16, and Xuheng Li, 17, are in high school, while the others are 12 to 14.

Hu has been playing the longest – since second grade – and also is the most proficient English speaker of the group. Coach Chen also speaks English well, but frequently consulted Google Translate during the interview to be sure he was getting it right. He also helped during awards presentations when Stephanie Threlkeld couldn't pronounce Chinese names.

It's the first time coming to America for Chen and his students, and they made a trip of it, visiting several East Coast cities along the way and making stops at prestigious colleges like Harvard, MIT and Princeton. They have been to Boston and New York, where they visited the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and will be going to Washington DC after the tournament.

"I made many friends in China through bridge who have come to the U.S. to attend college," Chen said, including Tianyang Chen, who is currently representing Princeton in the Collegiate Bridge Bowl, across the hall from the Youth NABC.

The RDFZ group arrived in Philadelphia a day early, in time to play in the 299er Pairs on Wednesday before the start of the Youth NABC. After two full days of bridge, they were tired when being interviewed after Thursday's games.

"We're still recovering," Hu said. "It's pretty fun. It's all worth it."

Jiashu Liu, 13, was unhappy about how the game with his partner had gone.

"After every session, we talk to each other about our mistakes," Hu said. "When you talk about it, everyone improves."

Although there is a 12-hour time difference, Chen is in contact with other coaches in China every day while here, he said.

Others in the RDFZ group are Bojun Zhang, 12, who has won an Under-12 event in China; Minghan Liu and Yilin Liu, 14, who have silver medals; Justin Cui, Chenghan Bai, and Xianze Liu, all 12; and Brady Lin, 14.

Hu was impressed with the friendly reception they got in the GRIN Room on Wednesday.

"I enjoyed the attitude that people treat you," he said. "I made a mistake on a Michaels bid and I got a compliment on my hand. It's the attitude that matters that make people want to play bridge here."

RDFZ has had some success at the international level. A team from

the school qualified to be China's Under-16 team at the World Youth Team Championships in 2023. Though they got beat by USA2 in the main event, they dropped into the BAM and won gold. The members of that team, now in grade 11, are currently playing in a tournament for older students in China. Another alum, Hongji Wei, was second in the Vanderbilt last year.

There has been a bridge program at RDFZ since 2007. Chen learned the game in 2009 when he was a seventh-grader there (or Junior 1, as it's called in China). He has been reading NABC Daily Bulletins since 2012 and was excited to finally come to America to attend an NABC.



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Red Ribbon Pairs begins today

The Red Ribbon Pairs, an ACBL event with national rating open to players with less than 2500 masterpoints, gets underway today. Before 2015, it was on the spring schedule.

Players earn qualification by placing first or second overall in regionally rated events of at least Flight B status. Neither member of a qualifying pair may hold more than 2500 masterpoints at the time of qualification.

The four-session event began in 1986 and winners are honored by the Percy X. Bean Trophy.

The trophy was designated by the ACBL Board of Directors in 1996 to honor Bean, ACBL president in 1972 and chairman of the Board in 1973.

Bean (1916–1992) represented District 19 on the Board from 1964 until 1988 and served as president of the ACBL Charity Foundation from 1974 until 1981. He was a member of the National Goodwill Committee and the National Board of Governors and general chairman of arrangements for the World Team Olympiad in Seattle in 1984.

Bean and his wife, Anne, were named ACBL Honorary Members for 1992, the first time that honor was bestowed on a husband-wife combination.

Bean was the editor of Mad, Mad World of Bridge, a publication that strongly championed players of less than expert class.

The Oshlag Fast Open Pairs, which requires players to finish their two-board rounds in 11 minutes, begins today. The event consists of two qualifying sessions followed by two final sessions tomorrow. In 2024, it was named in honor of Richard Oshlag, a two-time winner of the event, Grand Life Master and ACBL employee for over 50 years.

Oshlag began working for the ACBL in its Greenwich CT headquarters in 1969 as a proofreader and advertising manager for the Bridge Bulletin. When the League relocated to Memphis in 1972, much of the East Coast–based staff did not want to make the move. But Oshlag, tempted with a promotion to business manager of the Bulletin, accepted the change of venue.

In the early 1980s, Oshlag became increasingly interested in computers, and he switched positions to become data programming manager in 1984. He has been an integral part of the ACBL's computer/information technology departments since then. Oshlag was the architect for many of the League's computer-related projects over the decades.

Oshlag is a four-time NABC champion. He won the NABC+ Fast Open Pairs in 2017 and 2018 and was narrowly second in the contest in 2019. Oshlag consoled himself on missing the three-peat by winning the Silodor Open Pairs the same year. In 2011,

Richard won the Truscott/USPC Senior Swiss Teams playing with wife, Mary; it was their first national title. Richard and Mary enjoyed a successful, decades-long partnership which ended when Mary began suffering from dementia. She died in 2021.





East led the $\clubsuit 8$. Declarer took West's $\spadesuit Q$ with the $\spadesuit A$ and played a club to the queen and king, West switching to the $\blacktriangledown 9$ to the 10 and queen. East switched to the $\spadesuit 4$ and declarer won with the $\spadesuit A$ and played a club to the jack. West, who had seen his partner follow with the 4 and 6, ducked, and declarer cashed the $\spadesuit K$ and then played a diamond to the 4, 9 and a ruff. East continued with the $\blacktriangledown A$, at which point declarer claimed, +110.

Both sides had made major/minor mistakes, the bottom line being that 2 h should be defeated.

North led the ◆A and switched to the ♥8, declarer winning with the ♥9 and playing the ♠Q. South won and returned a diamond, but declarer ruffed and played another spade. There was nothing the defenders could do, +640, and 13 IMPs.



South led the \blacklozenge 10 to the 2, 6 and king, and declarer ran the \blacktriangledown 10, North winning and switching to the \spadesuit 10. Declarer won with the \spadesuit K, played a club to the queen, cashed the \clubsuit A and exited with a club. South won, cashed the \clubsuit 7 and now needed to exit with the \spadesuit 5. When he went with the \spadesuit J, declarer won and was still in the game. However, when he played a heart instead of the \spadesuit Q, South ruffed and exited with the \spadesuit 5. Declarer put up dummy's \spadesuit A, but that was still one down, -200.


Although West's redouble is a suggestion that 24 redoubled is a possible resting place, East's singleton is a warning sign that argues against passing.

A low heart lead will scuttle the contract, but West started with a Rusinow ♥9 to the jack and East's ace, as Krekorian dropped the 6. When East exited with the ♥5, declarer

played the 7 (concealing the 2), as West won the king. Hoping that East had started with A–5–2, West continued with the ♥10, only to see East pitch a low club as South followed with the 2. West exited with a heart to South's 8, as East released another low club. On the last two heart tricks, low spades were shed from dummy.

When Krekorian ran the ◆J, East discarded a low spade, so declarer placed East with a 5=2=0=6 pattern based on the early play. After unblocking the ♠K, Krekorian cashed the ◆A to reach this position:



When the ♠K is played, East has no good answer. A club discard allows declarer to run three club tricks, so East must release a spade. But declarer then cashes the ♣A K and plays a third club to East, who is forced to lead a spade from Q–x into dummy's A–J. Making three.



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

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

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ACBL Electronic Device Policy

This policy applies to all events at NABCs and events where ACBL is the Sponsoring Organization. Regional and Sectional tournaments are encouraged to adopt and apply this policy or one more well-suited to their players. A violation of any of the restrictions below will result in an automatic penalty, pursuant to Law 91 of the Laws of Duplicate Bridge.

1. Any electronic equipment must be kept in silent mode (except for health-related equipment, where silent mode is unavailable or could constitute a health risk).

It is recommended, though not mandatory, that any such equipment remain switched off while in the playing area during a session.

Penalties: If it is determined that an electronic equipment is not compliant with (1) above, the penalty for the first offense is 1/8 of a board, 1.5 IMPs, or ½ VP. For each subsequent offense

during an event, the penalty will be doubled. Beginning with the third offense, the player may be subject to disqualification, upon approval of the Sponsoring Organization.

2. Players are expected to be paying attention to the game. While at the table, players may not use or interact with their electronic devices during bridge play. When between rounds or sitting out, use or interaction with electronic devices is permitted, provided it is inaudible. For other situations, permission to use or interact with an electronic device will be granted upon the director's judgment and on a case-by-case basis.

Penalties: If it is determined that an electronic equipment was operated in violation of (2) above, the penalty for the first offense is ½ of a board, 6 IMPs, or 2 VP. For each subsequent offense during an event, the penalty will be doubled. Beginning with the second offense, the player may be subject to disqualification, upon approval of the Sponsoring

Organization.

The above restrictions apply to all players, captains, coaches and kibitzers, except those persons granted permission by the ACBL, and are in force throughout any playing session or segment of play.

A kibitzer in violation of these policies must leave the playing area and may be readmitted only by permission of the tournament director.

Penalties for captains and coaches: Same as for players.

For the purpose of this policy, each day of a multi-day event is treated independently.

Further restrictions and requirements may apply in events involving live internet and/or VuGraph coverage and/or instruction from the Sponsoring Organization.

For the purpose of this policy, Sponsoring Organization is the ACBL for NABCs, the organizing District for Regionals, and the organizing Unit for Sectionals.



Entry Fees

A valid ACBL player number is required to play in all events at the NABC.

For all daytime events, a discount of \$10 per player per session is available to

1) ConferenceDirect-reserved registered guests of the host hotel; 2) other registered guests/roommates added through the EE form; and 3) residents of the host district or within 50 miles of the playing site who purchase entries through Entry Express.

Players must be ACBL members whose service fees or dues are current in order to compete in any Premier NABC+, NABC+ or NABC events.

Premier NABC+ events are the Grand National Teams (Championship Flight), von Zedtwitz Life Master Pairs, Spingold Knockout Teams and the Roth Open Swiss Teams. The undiscounted entry fees for these contests are \$50 per player per session. For team events, this means \$200 per team per session for four-person teams, \$250 per team per session for five-person teams and \$300 per team per session for six-person teams.


NABC+ events are the NABC+ Open Pairs, Wagar Women's Pairs, Truscott/USPC Senior Swiss Teams, Wernher Open Pairs, Freeman Mixed Board-A-Match Teams and the Oshlag Fast Pairs. The undiscounted entry fees for these contests are \$45 per person per session. For team events, this means \$180 per team per session for four-person teams, \$225 per team per session for five-person teams and \$270 per team per session for six-person teams.

Note: \$1.50 per person per session benefits the International Fund for all of the above events.

NABC event are the Grand National Teams (Flights A, B & C), the 0–6000 and 0–3000 Mini-Spingold Knockouts, the NABC 0–10,000 Pairs, the 0–10,000 Mixed Swiss Teams, the Bruce LM–6000 Pairs, the Young 0–3000 Pairs and the Bean Red Ribbon Pairs. The undiscounted entry fee for these events is \$35 per player per session. For the team events, this means \$140 per team per session for teams of four, \$175 per team per session for teams of five and \$210 per team per session for teams of six. (The GNT Flights A, B & C have no fee the first two days of the contest.)

Regional events are \$32 per player per session for ACBL members, and \$37 for inactive members. For team events of one or two sessions, the entry fee is \$128 per session. Evening events are \$22 per session.

Events with a masterpoint limit of 300 or lower are \$28 per player per session for ACBL members, \$33 for inactive members.

In NABC+ events, \$1.50 (per person, per session) of each entry fee will be allocated to the ACBL International Fund. These funds are used to underwrite part of the expenses of ACBL players who participate in international competition.
